EYFS Literacy Work Week beginning 30.3.20

Dear Parent/Carers

From the observations and activity Mrs Watson and I are seeing on Tapestry, we can see that you have taken on the role of teaching your child at home with passion and gusto! Not only are you showing us your 'Yes I can' attitude but you are also trying your best in very dainting and unprecedented times. We do not under estimate how challenging this is. It really is very peculiar even for us! Here are some suggestions to support your child's Literacy and phonics development over the coming weeks.

- 1. Continue with daily reading and creating a love of books and sharing stories. Not only do we learn to read but also read to learn!
- 2. Continue with learning your child's animal words. In your home learning pack, we added your child's current words as well as the next set of words. All the animal words can be found in the front of Home School Diary when you require more.
- 3. In your Home Learning Pack your child's animal words in handwriting, sheets were provided. Use these to practise handwriting and reading skills.
- 4. Use the reading eggs app on a mobile, tablet, laptop or desktop computer.
- 5. Play games to use and apply your child's phonic knowledge e.g. animal words bingo, pairs, snap, using magnetic letters, playing hangman, playing scrabble/boggle, what's the word Mr Wolf, writing sounds or words in sand, mud, and chalk. The world is your oyster!
- 6. Use Letterjoin for handwriting skills on a mobile, tablet, laptop and desktop. The website is letterjoin co.uk. Login details are available at the beginning of your Home School Diary.

7. You could keep a diary of your home learning. Draw a picture and write about your day.

Encourage your child to

- 1. Use a capital letter at the beginning of the sentence.
- 2. Leave a finger space in between words.
- 3. Put a full stop at the end of the sentence.
- 4 Write in their neatest, smartest, cursive handwriting.

Other online resources to support Phonics:

1. Sophie from Read Write Inc is doing daily phonics on Facebook and You tube for children to watch at home. Films will show at the times below and will be available for 24 hours only. (Please go to ruthmiskin.com for further information.)

Set I is on at 9.30am, Set 2 is on at 10.00am, Set 3 is on at 10.30am.

Poetry time films are also uploaded daily and will be posted on you tube for you to enjoy again and again.

- 2. 'Mr Thorne does phonics with Geraldine Giraffe' on You Tube. The children seem to love this at school.
- 3. On You tube there are a number of Tricky Words and Sight Word songs compiled by Epic Phonics.
- 4. You may also know about Alphablocks. These characters help children learn to read and promote phonic skills for children. There are available episodes on You tube.
- 5. Phonics Play is also offering access to free resources.
 You are able to become a member, for free, to access reading ebooks with Oxford Owl. The link is https://www.oxfordowl.co.uk. More resources will be uploaded over the coming days and weeks to support home learning.

- 6. Amazon has made audio stories completely free for children. You can stream these from a huge collection. These are available on your desktop, laptop, phone or tablet.

Easter Egg Colour by Number








These activities and ideas are based around the book "We're Going on an Egg Hunt"

Growing Cress in Eggshells

Crack eggs so they have half an empty shell. Carefully draw on silly faces. Fill shells with wet cotton wool and sprinkle on cress seeds. Keep damp and watch the eggs hair grow!





Talking Together



Make a tally of how long it takes your eggs hair to grow or mark the days off on a calendar. Encourage your chid to take a photo every day and look back to discuss what happens over time.

Go hunting for other seeds in your house – look and talk about inside tomatoes apples and other fruits. Can you count the seeds or see the patterns inside when you cut them open.





Talking Together



Discuss shape and size of your bunny tails. Support your child's fine motor skills with rolling. Can we share between us? Can we roll small ones together to make big ones?

Use clothes pegs to pick up your bunny tails into containers. Play a song and then count how many you can get.

Can you beat your score?














Chocolate Nests

Melt a bar of chocolate in the microwave until soft. Help your child stir in cornflakes or shredded wheat until coated. Share into bun cases.

Take a packet of chocolate eggs and share between the nests.

Leave to cool before enjoying.





Egg and Spoon Race

Boil real eggs until hard. Use some big cooking spoons to balance them on. Have a race with your child in the garden or inside. Experiment with what you can do with your body whilst balancing.





Talking Together

Who can walk the furthest without dropping your egg?
Who can balance their egg the longest standing on I leg? We could time it using our phone. We can count how many steps we can take. Can you balance your egg on your hand?
Can you stand and balance your egg and count to 10 or 20?
What about to 20 and back again?







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Talking Together

Talk about the chocolate before it is cooked and about melting. What has happened? How many spoons of goo do we need to make a nest. Let's share our eggs so each bird has the same amount. Who can we share our nests with? If there are 2 grown ups and 3 children how many nests will we need for them all to have one?

Go out for a bird hunt and see how many birds you can see.



Were they all the same?

See if you can see any nests in trees.





Bunny Tails

Take a large bag of folded cotton wool. With your child pick out fingerfuls and roll into balls to make bunny tails. Discuss the shape and size and can you group into big, medium, small sizes.

Use for making Easter cards afterwards!







Making Collections


Go on a springtime walk and hunt objects that your child finds interesting. You could take a basket or use any container from around the house.




Spread the objects out and talk about them. Sort into groups or make arrangements.

Discuss them e.g. Some of these are plastic some are made of wood. This has corners, this looks like a circle.

Can we make a pattern with our objects?

Why are they a group? Do they have the same number of stripes, holes or points?








Decorating Eggs

Boil some real eggs until hard boiled. Once cooled use felt tips or paint to decorate. Add whatever decorations you have to make appealing. Hide for future egg hunts or display as decorations to talk about.










Discuss the patterns you use when decorating - zig zag, wavy, stripes, dots.

Can we decorate with a repeating pattern? In colour e.g. red yellow, red yellow or with shapes – circle square circle square. What are our favourite colours to use? Can we mix these to make them darker or lighter?











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Egg Box Play

Use empty 10 hole egg boxes or ice trays for sorting trays.

Draw on the bottom of the egg box numbers in order. Go hunting for tiny objects of the same amount to put inside.





Talking Together

I wonder what kind of objects will fit? Will we need smaller objects for bigger numbers?

Write the numbers out of order on a new egg box and play a reveal game. Which number is under which egg?

If we put 5 eggs in our box, can you move them around and show me 5 in a different way?

Lets do this with different amounts of eggs.

For the number under the egg lets do that many skips hops jumps or bunny ears!






Number or Shape Hunt

Hurray for shapes today!"




Point out numbers or shapes in the environment and let your child take photos of them. Encourage them to spot the shapes.
